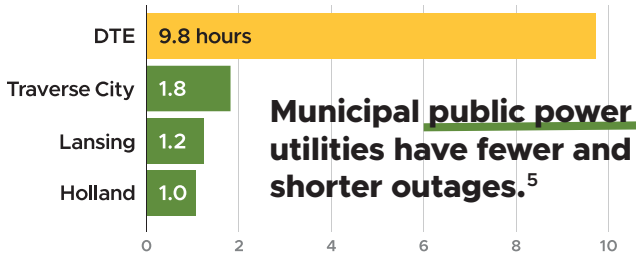
DTE bragged to their shareholders in Feb. 2023 about deferring maintenance work to increase profits.¹

With a public power utility, profits don't go to lobbying, ads, or shareholders² - but to **improving our power grid.**

40+ cities in Michigan have public power utilities, including Lansing, Holland, and Traverse City.³

DTE is the slowest utility at returning power to customers after an outage.⁴

Average time to restore power following an outage in hours (CAIDI)

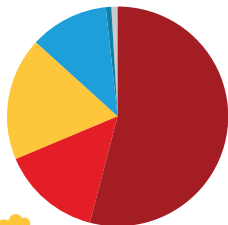


Municipal public power utilities have fewer and shorter outages.⁵

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Only 13% of DTE's power comes from renewable energy.⁶



DTE's 2022 Fuel Mix

- 54% Coal
- 15% Gas/Oil
- 18% Nuclear
- 12% Wind
- 1% Solar

DTE is the 4th dirtiest major utility in the US.⁷ Sierra Club gave DTE's energy transition plan to renewables a failing **F** grade.⁸
